Shortly after the first of this year, Andrews Home & Auto Supply, aka The Firestone, closed it's doors to the public. Reed Andrews has operated the store on Main Street in Randleman for about 65 years.

Reed was raised in Chatham County, born May 31, 1920, the eight child born to his parents. He attended Campbell College.

During WWII Reed joined the Army Air Corps and became a B17 crew member although, an ear problem eventually grounded him. continued on page 2

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Upon returning to North Carolina, Reed opened a store in a building farther down Main Street, next door to what was then the bank. He also lived in an apartment on Main Street for about two years. As business improved, he moved down the street, into a building that had been a restaurant, and eventually into the larger building that comprised the main store. The store is a catacomb of back and side rooms used for storage, a service area, and a complete retread shop. If you were one of the many that he chose to give a tour, he would walk into a dark room and pull a sting to turn on a light, then walk farther into the

room and pull another string to turn on another light and reveal even more space. This continued as he moved deeper into the room or into an adjoining room.

The Firestone was not just a place to get auto parts and services but, Reed carried items for the hunter, fisherman, home handyman, and homemaker. With the exception of the food, you could purchase all the items you needed to prepare and serve a meal, including the stove. Whether you were working on the electric or plumbing, repairing a bike, a lawn mower, or a 1948 Hudson, Reed probably had what you needed. Reed once told me his grandfather had run a store and had given him some advice that he tried to follow, "if you

don't have it, you can't sell it". Reed tried to have a little of everything in his store. Some of what was in the store when the doors closed, might have been there when the doors first opened but, if someone came in looking for it, he wanted to have it.

After you picked out the items you came to get and as you made your way to the counter to pay, Reed would always inquire as to whether you needed any light bulbs or floor polish, and when in season, maybe some sweet potatoes. I don't know how much he was able to sell but, I know of at least one person that has a two pound can of Beacon Paste Wax on his shelf.

## **Construction Begins**

Randleman Parking Lot.

Construction has finally begun on the parking lot behind the Main Street shops. They are working on one side at a time. Construction started on the side with the library. The two small buildings next to the library have been taken down and the pavement has been taken up. They will bury the utilities, enlarge the parking lot, build areas for landscaping with new lamp posts. The plan also

calls for a stage and a farmers market and fixing up the rear facades of the shops framing the parking lot. The idea is to give the area the feel of a small village.











### THIS MONTH IN AUTOMOTIVE HISTORY

**05-01-1926:** On this day in 1926, Ford Motor Company becomes one of the first companies in America to adopt a five-day, 40-hour week for workers in its automotive factories. The policy would be extended to Ford's office workers the following August. Ford announced that it would pay its male factory workers a minimum wage of \$5 per eight-hour day, upped from a previous rate of \$2.34 for nine hours (the policy was adopted for female workers in 1916). The news shocked many in the industry--at the time, \$5 per day was nearly double what the average auto worker made--but turned out to be a stroke of brilliance, immediately boosting productivity along the assembly line and building a sense of company loyalty and pride among Ford's workers.

**05-02-1918:** General Motors Corporation (GM), which would become the world's largest automotive firm, acquires Chevrolet Motor Company. GM had been founded a decade earlier by William C. "Billy" Durant, a former carriage maker from Flint, Michigan, whose Durant-Dort Carriage Company had taken control of the ailing Buick Motor Company. On September 16, 1908, Durant incorporated Buick into a new entity, General Motors, which by the end of that decade had welcomed other leading auto manufacturers--including Oldsmobile, Cadillac and Oakland--into its fold. In 1910, with GM struggling financially, stockholders blamed Durant's aggressive expansionism and forced him out of the company he founded. In November 1911, he launched Chevrolet Motor Company, named for his partner, the Swiss race car driver Louis Chevrolet.

After his retirement in 2010, he began to volunteer at the Museum in 2011 where he has led a highly effective effort to review and update the inventory of the Museum's vehicle collection.
